Shinnen Enkai celebrates Year of the Dragon

The Japanese Cultural Society of Maui (JCS Maui) will welcome the Year of the Dragon at its annual Shinnen Enkai (New Year) dinner on Saturday, Jan. 28, at the elleair Rainbow Room at the Maui Beach Hotel. The Shinnen Enkai will begin at 5 p.m. with the traditional otoso (sake welcome) with no-host cocktail hour to follow. Dinner is scheduled for 6 p.m.

Cost for the buffet dinner

is \$45, \$20 for children ages 6-10, and free for children ages 5 and under. Tickets are available through the Maui Box Shop and Credit Associates in Wailuku Party Paradise in the Maui Mall, and Sanrio at Queen Kaahumanu Center.

The event will highlight the past year's events and programs sponsored by JCS Maui, install the organization's newly elected officers, and will feature performances by Japanese dancer **Dazzman Taguchi** of Honolulu.

Hiroshi Arisumi and Rev. Torako Arine will be honored as the JCS Maui Nihon Bunka Awardees for 2012. Selected by the JCS Maui Board at a recent meeting, Arisumi and Arine have contributed much to preserving and promoting the Japanese culture.

Arisumi, a WWII veteran, will be recognized for his outstanding contribution to the promotion of cultural exchanges and mutual understanding between Japan and the United States. Arisumi has been a generous benefactor to the Maui Japanese Communi-

ty Association and the Japanese Cultural Society of Maui and a steadfast supporter of their programs that promote friendly relations, cultural exchanges, and mutual understanding between Japan and the United States. As a surviving member of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, he ardently establish the Nisei Veterans Memorial Center on

Maui since the idea was conceived in 1985 until it opened its doors in 2006. In his role as President of the Nisei Veterans Memorial Center, he continues to work on programs to teach the youth and inform the public about the valor of and the sacrifices made by the Nisei (second generation; Americans born to Japanese immigrant parents) soldiers during the Second World War.

For decades, Arine, 98, the leader of Maui Jinsha Shinto Shrine, has held a Japanese-language service every first Sunday of the month, along with New Year's and Autumn Festival celebra-

tions. Arine's late husband, Masao Arine, headed the church during the early 1940s until his death in 1972. Shortly after that, she traveled to Japan to become a priestess and has been leading the church ever since. Thanks to Rev. Torako Arine, the Great Autumn Festival continues to this day See


Paia Mantokuji Bazaar set in March
